Dr. Tereza Freidingerová



Charles University

Tereza Freidingerová is a researcher at the Faculty of Social Sciences, Charles University, and serves as a migration analyst with the NGO People in Need. She holds a PhD in social geography and regional development from Charles University. Her current research centers on the Vietnamese diaspora in Czechia, with a particular focus on Vietnamese settlement in rural areas. Freidingerová's work explores the translocal and transnational practices and networks of the Vietnamese community within the context of Central and Eastern Europe (CEE), contributing to a deeper understanding of migration dynamics and integration patterns in this region.



Dr. Susanne Klien

Susanne Klien is Professor at the Modern Japanese Studies Program, Hokkaido University. She works at the intersection of anthropology, mobility studies and Japanese Studies. Her research interests are urban to rural lifestyle migration, transnational lifestyle migration, subjective well-being, precarity, demographic change, post-growth, regional revitalisation and tourism. Her monograph "Urban migrants in rural Japan: between agency and anomie in a post-growth society" (State University of New York Press 2020) was awarded the 2020 Choice Outstanding Academic Title.





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Dr. Sudarat Musikawong

Sudarat Musikawong is Associate Professor of Sociology with the Institute for Population and Social Research at Mahidol University in Thailand. She positions her investigations within political sociology and ethnographic research. Her publications include with Johanna Lee and Kimberly Rogovin, "Discrimination during COVID-19: assessing migrant workers' vulnerability to forced labor in Thailand's seafood industry," Asian and Pacific Migration Journal (June 2024). She is working on a book manuscript - "Precarious rights: trafficking in migrant workers lives", based on fieldwork about Southeast Asian migrant worker justice in the Thailand, South Korea, USA, and Taiwan.





Dr. Itaru Nagasaka

Itaru Nagasaka is a Professor of cultural anthropology of Hiroshima university, Japan. He has conducted anthropological fieldwork on Filipino transnational migration. His recent research projects include: "Reconfigurations and resilience of Filipino migrant workers under the pandemic"; "Care, mobilities and reconfiguration of intimate circles in Southeast Asia".



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Dr. Anjum Shabbir

Anjum Shabbir is an independent researcher in EU law. She was AspirE's main EU migration law and policy analyst as a representative for the Brussels-based Centre for European Policy Studies. In that role, she wrote an EU-level report "Humanising EU migration: the transitioning of statuses in EU regular and labour migration law", and Policy Brief "A critical appraisal of the EU's regular migration system". She also worked on Justice and Home Affairs aspects of EU law during her time at information platform EU Law Live, at the Court of Justice of the European Union, and at NGOs such as the AIRE Centre in London.



Dr. Simeng Wang

Simeng Wang is a Permanent Research Fellow at The French National Center for Scientific Research (CNRS). She publishes extensively on Chinese migration to France and to Europe, including the edited Special Issue "Chinese migration to and within Europe: between continuity and renewal" (Journal of Chinese Overseas, 2023) and "Handbook of Chinese Migration to Europe" (forthcoming, 2024). She is the scientific curator of the Exhibition "East and Southeast Asian migration to France since 1860" held at the French National Museum of Immigration History (Paris, 2023-2024). She is also the founder and coordinator of the research network on East and South-East Asian Migrations in France.







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
