

The Centre for Research and Studies in Sociology (CIES-Iscte) is a social science R&D unit of Iscte - University Institute of Lisbon, recognised and evaluated by the FCT, with the aim of creating and promoting knowledge about current social problems from a multidisciplinary perspective.

Founded in 1985, with sociology as its main scientific area, the center also carries out relevant activities in the fields of public policy, political science, communication sciences, modern and contemporary history and social work.

The main mission of CIES is to produce high quality research that contributes to the understanding and awareness of societal challenges and global threats and to provide evidence-based policy recommendations.



## Foreword



## **Teresa Patrício**CIES-Iscte Director

We are living in deeply challenging times posed by world pandemics, war, conflicts and displacements, political polarization and rising authoritarianism, environmental sustainability, widening inequalities, digital and technological transformations, and growing uncertainty. In today's rapidly evolving world, the study of social sciences has never been more relevant. At CIES, key disciplines of the social sciences – sociology, political science, communication sciences,

public policy, modern and contemporary history and social work – collaborate to promote an understanding of the world we live in. We examine the historical roots of change, the role of individuals and institutions in shaping it, and the way change manifests across various dimensions of society. Social sciences help comprehend societal changes but also empower us to address pressing challenges.

In the last six years we have confronted numerous difficulties such as those posed by the Covid-19 pandemic and the restraints of the financial crisis. Limited science funding led to successive frustrations at the level of research careers, research infrastructures and research projects. During this period, we also lost several trailblazing researchers. João Ferreira de Almeida, former president of Iscte, left indispensable work in sociology. Juan Mozzicaffredo left valuable contributions in the field of public administration and Britta Baumgarten's memory continues in a seminar cycle dedicated to social movements.

Notwithstanding the difficult times, CIES was able to secure research projects, contract new researchers, diversify funding sources, and produce new knowledge. We initiated capacity-building projects in the global south, participated in societal dissemination programs and activities, and contributed significantly to public policy. During this period, CIES restructured its research groups providing more coherence and conceptual focus and linking their research activities with the Observatories and Laboratories. to provide timely data and studies that inform and contribute to public policies. We continue to train and integrate young researchers and attract top students to our doctoral programs.

A major change experienced during this period was the setting up of a new research complex, Iscte – Knowledge and Innovation, to house the Center for Valorization and Technology Transfer (CVTT), a research and knowledge transfer infrastructure that hosts research centers, laboratories and observatories. These new facilities, based on the principles of the New European Bauhaus, are designed to connect, link and

transform places of learning as interactive and inclusive areas that reach out to the community.

At the same time, CIES together with five other research units at Iscte obtained the status of Associate Laboratory to develop the SocioDigital Lab for Public Policy and promote interdisciplinary research on social change and digital transformation with an impact on public policies. The Associate Lab together with the institutional framework provided by Iscte strengthens the research environment that includes promoting a research career and creating new opportunities for scientific employment.

Confronting our challenging times requires innovative perspectives that leverage networks, build alliances, engage constructively in research initiatives to provide evidence-based policy recommendations and solutions. Together, important steps to ensure the future of social science research and to create a fruitful work environment have been created.

The Scientific Council includes all the integrated PhD researchers and is responsible for electing the Centre's Director and the Scientific Committee.


### External Advisory Board






## Transnational perspective

## Research Infrastructures

### **Observatories & Laboratories**

Observatories and Laboratories play an important role in understanding and addressing societal issues. Their primary functions include data collection, analysis and dissemination, which inform public policy, academic research, and public understanding. They also contribute to advanced training by providing internships and research opportunities for Masters and doctoral students. The observatories have strengthened their mission of making rigorous and up-to-date information available to the public in their thematic areas, empowering citizens and contributing to public policies. While the laboratories have deepened their specialised competences and their cross-cutting potential towards support for research activities.





### **Inequality Observatory**

The Inequality Observatory provides updated information, analyses, and scientific knowledge on social inequality, fostering citizenship and contributing to the design and evaluation of public policies to address its root causes. Inequality is studied in different dimensions and levels, using statistical indicators, international comparisons, and a wide range of constantly updated research and studies.

Social inequality is multidimensional - not limited to a single factor - and identified in areas such as employment, income and wealth, education, qualifications and skills, gender, ethnic, racial, age, health, among others. The multidimensionality of inequalities constitutes one of the most striking features of contemporary societies.

CIES is responsible for the scientific coordination, partnering with the Institute of Sociology of the University of Porto and the Center for Social Studies of the University of the Azores.

### **Emigration Observatory**

The main objective of the Emigration Observatory is to collect, harmonize and analyze information on the evolution and characteristics of Portuguese emigration, by collecting data from statistical institutions of the countries of destination of emigrated Portuguese populations.

Annual indicators include stocks (total population, place of birth, nationality, Portuguese origin and consular records), Portuguese inflows in destination countries, acquisition of nationality in destination country and emigrants' remittances. Statistical indicators include data on the entry and stay in the countries of destination, with updating of indicators.

The Emigration Observatory works in partnership with Center for Geographical Studies of the University of Lisbon, the Research Center for Economic and Organizational Sociology of the University of Lisbon, and the Institute of Sociology of the University of Porto.

# Portuguese Observatory on Cultural Activities

The Portuguese Observatory on Cultural Activities is responsible for the development and production of studies and information on various cultural themes and domains, such as cultural practices, cultural and artistic agents and institutions, cultural employment, and cultural democratization, including the production and dissemination of indicators on art and culture.

The Portuguese Observatory on Cultural Activities partners with public and private institutions, in particular with the Directorate-General for the Arts of the Ministry of Culture, based on providing a range of secondary, official, and national statistical sources on cultural policies.

### Observatory of Democracy and Political Representation

The Observatory for Democracy and Political Representation concentrates its activities on democratic political representation and the integration of its citizens in political and decision-making processes, thus identifying linkages between the electorate, the elected representatives, and the formulation and implementation of public policy. Elected representatives – at the governmental levels – are held accountable for their use of power and public policies reflecting most voters' preferences.

Surveys, such as the Comparative Candidate Survey, provide comparative data on values, guidelines, and behaviors of elected and non-elected candidates. Citizen participation, either individually or through interest groups or social and political movements, is assessed in the political process and in political representation.



# Research for Capacity Building

An important contribution of CIES has been the development of a cluster of capacity-building projects at the international level, supported by state-of-the-art research competencies in social sciences, impacting people's lives and influencing public policies. In this context, CIES researchers led or participated in a dozen international projects with capacity-building objectives that required field experience and community involvement.

Most of these projects have been funded by the Erasmus + program and involved European and global south partners in Africa or South America, such as higher education institutions, migration officials, and journalists.

Other projects focused on capacity building initiatives in Europe, such as ARECA that promotes participatory art education models by artists in school programs. Some of the outputs of the capacity-building projects included promoting human rights, providing education and training in new formats such as improving the quality of information and public discourse, providing handbooks, curricular units, and e-learning tools that help strengthen skills and competencies.

# Response to the Covid 19 Pandemic

The pandemic challenged and disrupted traditional research activities. Researchers quickly adapted to remote methods and digital tools, changed data collection strategies and research priorities. Research on social, cultural and health impacts of Covid-19 was one of CIES' important contributions with a strong transversal and innovative character. A major study organized by the Inequality Observatory spearheaded analysis on how society dealt with uncertainty and instability collectively. "A sociological look at the Covid-19 Crisis" consisting of 19 interviews with sociologists on various inequality issues, and is available on YouTube, collated in an e-book with thousands of visualizations and downloads. Multiple projects addressed the effects of the pandemic on communities, minorities and vulnerable populations. Gender inequality was an important topic as closing schools and care homes imposed more responsibilities on women and saw increases in domestic violence that weighed upon victim support services. Assessing the impact on mental health and well-being of immigrant populations was also an important research topic with research addressing the socio-sanitary coordination procedures of institutionalized older-aged in 15 EU countries.

CIES organized the Research Forum on Scientific Work and the Pandemic and advanced training activities in the summer school on Adapting Working Methodologies in Uncertain Times in Child Protection.

Research results from our research were cited by World Health Organization; UN Environment Program; and EU Publications Office.

# Research for Empowering Citizenship

Involvement with multiple partners - government, local authorities, NGOs, private sector, and different stakeholders - to empower citizenship through providing knowledge, open communication, and information, enhancing critical thinking and participation has been actively promoted. The Observatories and Laboratories contribute to empowering citizenship and community development through the production and dissemination of knowledge, open access platforms for citizen engagement and feedback and contributions to policymaking. The Emigration Observatory publishes an annual factbook and, in 2023, published the Atlas of Portuguese Emigration with comparative data on Portuguese and world emigration. This document was widely and publicly discussed.

In addition, several European projects address citizen empowerment, community engagement, and social inclusion. SPACE4US explores multidimensional and participative approaches for empowerment of young women. SDIT examines inclusive and beneficial practices of the theater for integrating people with autism. POIESIS studies the impact of research integrity and societal engagement practices on trust in science; RESISTANCE looks at inequality and discrimination against minorities through a cultural, historical, and comparative perspective. InCITIES examines higher education institutions in urban environments and their transformation into sustainable resilient institutions. Mapping Out looks at contemporary anti-immigration movements as to influence European migration policies. Other projects examine the loss of trust in democratic institutions or how artistic productions of urban youth can overcome segregation and build more inclusive societies.

# Spotlight on Inequalities

One of the most important contributions has been the transversal focus on inequalities. The Inequality Observatory provides up-to-date information, analyses, and knowledge on social inequality, publicly available, fostering citizenship and contributing to the design and evaluation of public policies to address its root causes. Inequality is studied in different dimensions and levels, using statistical indicators, international comparisons, and a wide range of constantly updated research and studies. At the same time, theoretical contributions in this field, namely on transnational inequalities, distributional and categorical inequalities, territorial and temporal inequalities, were made.

Some of the core themes include immigration and school trajectories; education and training; housing; work and employment; income inequality and poverty; gender discrimination; ethnic and linguistic stigmatization. Some of the most relevant projects include Inclusion+ that fosters inclusivity and diversity of mobility in higher education students by tackling barriers of students with disabilities and care responsibilities. Other projects such as PandPAS aim to facilitate inclusion and prevent xenophobia and radicalization and RaCIP engages in private sponsorship and promotes inclusion and active participation of thirdcountry nationals in society, spanning 9 EU Member States. HOPES looks at new housing movements and urban struggles. Inequality is also studied by looking at the transformation of work and employment, such as the increase in precariousness (Prowork) and the mutual dependence between employment and social protection (EmployALL). TIWELL measured and monitored social inequality across regional, national, and European dimensions using European Social Survey data.

## Tackling Methodological Challenges

Promoting social research methods and making significant contributions in terms of methodological innovation is a main challenge. The Laboratory for Innovative Methodologies (LIM) promotes innovative methodological practices through workshops, interdisciplinary collaborations, and develops advanced methodological training courses (ex. Advanced Methods in Statistics and Data Analysis, Computer-Assisted Qualitative Data Analysis, Mixed Methods and Triangulation between Quantitative and Qualitative Methods, Biographical Method, Life Course Methodologies, Data Visualization Methods). Interdisciplinary discussions were promoted in the Conference "The Challenges of Research", the "Group Interpretation Workshop", the Doctoral Colloquium and the Research Design Seminar.

MediaLab also contributes to the development of the analysis of communication practices in different forms: digital, analogue, text, image, sound, audiovisual, multimedia, online networks and social media, online surveys and user opinions, information visualization and data science, providing necessary software tools.

The CIES Research Forum 2023 on "Reflexivity and Methodological Innovation in the Social Sciences" brought together qualitative and quantitative methodologies, interdisciplinary approaches, archival research, evaluation methodologies on public policies, epistemological, methodologic, and ethical challenges, biographical, urban ethnography, and data collection. These events promote a space for discussion and contribute to the advancement, understanding, and application of social science research methodologies.

# Internationalization

CIES researchers take part in a wide range of international scientific activities, including coordination and participation in research projects and networks, providing scientific advice and contribution in evaluations and peer review panels, and dissemination of results to international audiences.

CIES-Iscte also hosts international researchers at the Centre and promotes the international mobility of its researchers.

### **Research Projects**

European R&D projects are a key component of CIES activities, ensuring collaboration and state-of-the-art knowledge to evidence-based policy solutions. A main concern is to address critical social and political problems that impact European society.

Numerous projects include Portuguese-speaking countries - Brazil, Cape Verde, Guinea-Bissau, Angola, Mozambique, Timor and Macao. Many of such projects, coordinated by CIES researchers, are oriented towards capacity-building in the global south or in different regions of the world.

### **Research Networks**

International networks promote information exchange, broaden scientific connections, enhance interdisciplinary experience and lead to fruitful collaborations.

The COST Actions promote interdisciplinary and pan-European networks. CIES researchers are currently members of the Management Committee of 18 COST Actions, leading Working Groups in many cases.

CIES is a member of IMISCOE – International Migration, Integration and Social Cohesion, the largest interdisciplinary network of scholars in the field of migration. The membership of other large European networks includes the European Consortium for Political Research (ECPR), the Consortium of European Social Data Archive (CESSDA), and the European Social Survey (ESS). CIES is a long-standing member of Comparative Candidates Survey (CCS) and is actively participates in the European Journalism Observatory (EJO), the European Network of Observatories in the Field of Arts and Cultural Education (ENO), the International Council of Social Welfare (ICSW), the European Network

for the Analysis of Social Policy (ESPAnet), in the Science and Technology Studies (STS MIGTEC), and the China-Europe Research Platform on Chinese Migration to and beyond Europe (CERPE).

CIES researchers provide expertise in research boards, committees and review panels, such as in evaluating EU research projects, including Marie Curie Actions and European Research Council grants; in COST Actions, "La Caixa" Foundation Fellowships; and the Canadian SSH Research Council.

# Inclusive and Democratic approach to Internationalization

CIES-Iscte's internationalization efforts are aligned with the mission to bridge science and society and to democratize knowledge. Recognizing the disparities in knowledge production, CIES-Iscte is dedicated to closing the gap between Global South and Global North academia through equitable collaboration. To achieve this, researchers from the Global South are regularly invited as visiting scholars and keynote speakers, while fostering partnerships through joint projects, publications, and co-supervision initiatives. These activities facilitate fair and equitable knowledge circulation, enabling CIES-Iscte and its partner institutions in the Global South to learn from each other and collaboratively produce innovative knowledge that highlights the diverse academic contributions made by Global South scholars.

Furthermore, acknowledging the societal hierarchies in knowledge dissemination and the barriers created by the dominance of English-language publications, CIES-Iscte is committed to ensuring that its research is accessible to the communities we work with in the Global South, as well as to its academic circle and practitioners in the region. In addition to publishing in top-tier international journals, CIES-Iscte prioritizes releasing materials in Portuguese to ensure that the emerging generation of young scholars in Portuguese-speaking countries has access to the most current knowledge.

By doing so, we are dedicated to fostering an inclusive and democratic approach to internationalization.





# International mobility




# Publications.








### Sociologia, Problemas e Práticas Journal

The Colloquium promotes and disseminates doctoral research by encouraging a broad debate on scientific topics and on research methods, problems and results. PhD students discuss their research with other students, professors and researchers.

#### International Cycle of PhD Conferences

106 sessions 2018 - 2023

With this Cycle students attend conferences with internationally renowned researchers having a chance to contact with these researchers and to deepen knowledge and debate in the scientific field.

The conferences organized by the seven PhD managed by CIES, with an average of 18 per year, take place in presence, except in the periods of Covid-19 pandemic, when they had to be held online. In 2018-2023 speakers came from all over the world, from 21 different countries, many European, but also extending to countries in America and Africa, including names such as Ann Nilsen, Margaret Archer, Colin Crouch, Daniel Bertaux, Philipe Schmitter, Stephen Ball, David Silverman, Elias Torres, Catherine Delcroix, Richard Lachman, among many others.

#### The PhD programs have established a broad international cooperation through:


- Participation of social scientists of international reference in the International Cycle of Doctoral Conferences and as lectures in optional curricular units;
- Partnerships with other universities (Erasmus+ program) and agreements with foreign universities.
- Possibility for some PhD students to carry out part of their research in foreign institutions,
   benefiting from the membership of CIES in a wide range of international networks;
- Participation of researchers from other countries in the orientation of PhD theses:
- Participation of researchers from other countries in juries.

The Center's support structures ensure the necessary follow-up, both in the administrative management of the students' training path and in their research activities.

In this context, CIES also provides invaluable assistance to PhD candidates in preparing applications for scholarships from the National Foundation for Science and Technology (FCT), and from Iscte and other funding institutions. PhD students also have access to specialized software (SPSS, MAXQDA, Qualtrics, etc.), to Iscte laboratories (Laboratory for Innovative Methodologies, MediaLab), and to the Iscte Library and access to the Online Knowledge Library (b-on), which provides access to the full text to thousands of journals and ebooks of the main international scientific publishers. Doctoral students with exclusive dedication and scholarships are offered a working space in a shared office.







The level of employability of doctorates is very high. A significant number of PhD holders remain connected to CIES or to other national and foreign research units, after winning contracts aimed at PhD holders.

In the case of PhD holders who have maintained a professional insertion parallel to the completion of the PhD, many of them experience a professional requalification. In recent years, the employability rate one year after completing the doctorate has ranged from 90 to 100 per cent. Around 60 per cent had obtained employment before or during their doctorate and the remaining after their doctorate. The vast majority worked in areas related to their PhD, in a direct way, and only a small percentage (10 per cent) worked in a different area.

#### Short Term Programs

CIES is committed to fostering academic growth and global exchange by organizing dynamic initiatives like summer, fall and winter schools. These programs offer participants an immersive experience, combining innovative sociological research with interdisciplinary learning.

Designed for students and scholars, these initiatives provide a unique platform to engage with leading experts, develop new skills, and expand professional networks.



#### Fall School

The 1st edition of the Fall School was held in 2023, in partnership with the Methodological Innovation Laboratory and School of Sociology and Public Policy. This initiative was a significant opportunity for students and professionals aiming to deepen their knowledge of research methods and data analysis. Over an intensive week, participants had the chance to engage in practical and theoretical workshops led by renowned experts in the field.

This initiative offered a unique opportunity for participants to enhance their research and data analysis skills while fostering collaboration and networking.

#### Summer & Winter Schools

In partnership with the IPPS, CIES organizes two annual training activities: the European Drugs Summer School and the Winter School. These activities are supported by experts from the European Monitoring Centre for Drugs and Drug Addiction (EMCDDA).

The schools aim to equip professionals and students with the knowledge and skills to address complex policy issues related to drug use in Europe and around the world. CIES has been part of the organization of this initiative since 2014.


#### Public Policy Contributions

CIES research has contributed in numerous ways to support public policy initiatives and to shape decision-making.

Contributions include influencing agenda setting and decision-making, identifying trends that can impact policy decisions, shaping legislation, raising public awareness, providing expert testimony and expertise, monitoring and evaluating public policies and achieving policy prominence in key roles. CIES plays an active role in many different policy fields such as inequality, culture, community development, social welfare, education, migration and integration, environment, science and higher education, urban issues and defense.

The Center's specialized Observatories, namely the Inequality Observatory, the Emigration Observatory and the Portuguese Observatory on Cultural Activities operate as key structures in the production and dissemination of scientific knowledge and statistical information according to requests and challenges posed by public policies agencies and civil society. The Observatories provide evidence-based research that contributes to public policy and to more effective and targeted interventions that positively impact communities and societies. CIES has actively engaged with policymakers at various levels, fostering collaborations between academia and government institutions.

The Centre has developed and promoted platforms for dialogue, allowing researchers and policymakers to exchange ideas and perspectives. These synergies are reflected in the wide-ranging formal collaborations and projects funded by executive and public entities. Between 2018 and 2023 is possible to identify 56 projects focused on structuring civil society issues and financed by public institutions, such as intermunicipal communities, city councils, public agencies, regional directorates, directorates-general, secretaries-general and ministries.

#### PUBLIC POLICY HIGH-LEVEL OFFICES

CIES researchers have been appointed to key decision-making positions. In the last six years, these include two ministers (Culture; National Defense); Secretary of State for Integration and Migration; President of the National Council of Education; Director of the Social Development Department of the Social Security Institute, IP; Commissioner for the Celebration of the 50th anniversary of the 25th April.

#### LEGISLATIVE IMPACT

The study "Class Size in the Portuguese Education System" (2017) carried out by the research team coordinated by Luís Capucha led to the normative order (Despacho normativo n° 1-B/2017) that defined limits to class size in various school years.

#### **PUBLIC POLICY FORUM**

The Public Policy Forum brings together high-level government officials and policymakers, politicians, academics, researchers, jornalists, students, and many other concerned citizens to address complex societal challenges and advance the public good.

The annual initiative held since 2012 in partnership with the Institute for Social and Public Policy, debates ideas and provides knowledge and information that helps improve planning, implementing, regulating, and evaluating public policies in Portugal.

In the last years, the Forum addressed the following policy concerns:

#### Social Impact

The impact of CIES activities extends beyond academia, reflecting broader implications for society. CIES's overarching research objectives encompass not only the advancement of scientific research, but also specialised training, and the dissemination of knowledge to society, addressing the needs and concerns of stakeholders and citizens. A fundamental premise of research impact is that the inclusion and active involvement of various stakeholders in research processes can yield more beneficial research outcomes. Alongside media outreach and engagement with public policies, CIES researchers played a crucial role in transferring generated knowledge to society through iterative practices involving several profiles of organisations, as private, non-profit and Civil Society Organizations (CSOs). The nature of interactions and the roles adopted by participants in this exchange vary.

Through collaborative efforts with these non-academic partners and engagement in diverse contexts, CIES conducted activities aimed at disseminating knowledge, cocreating solutions, and catalysing societal transformation with fostering participation and facilitating change within local and global communities.

#### NETWORK ACTIVITIES, PARTNERSHIPS & COLLABORATIONS

While most of CIES's scientific research was funded by government and public grants, 24 projects were developed between 2018 and 2023 with funding from 15 private non-profit organisations. The funded projects are distributed across the various research groups, with a particular focus on three: Media and Culture, Inequality, Work and Social Well-Being, and Education and Science. Among the funding organisations, six have international reach.

#### In this context, four organisations stand out due to their enduring and frequent connections with CIES:

- Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation, an international foundation based in Portugal, has provided funding for the development of individuals and organisations through initiatives spanning art, science, education, and charity.
- Francisco Manuel dos Santos Foundation, whose mission is to promote and improve knowledge of Portuguese realities, has funded other projects.
- Fundação Millennium bcp, which promotes initiatives in the fields of culture, education, research and charity, together with a company (ONI), financed a research partnership with CIES and the Directorate-General for Cultural

Heritage (DGPC), the entity responsible for museum policies in Portugal, to produce a National Museums Visitors Survey (see Box 1 and Box 7).

 A non-profit organisation connected with McDonald's restaurants (ARS) has financed three projects (see Box 2).

Other notable funding partners include:

Non-profit international foundations such as Fundación "la Caixa" and Aga Khan Foundation.

Getting to know national museums visitors, together with a bank foundation and the Directorate General for Cultural Heritage (DGPC)

The National Museums Visitor Study (EPMN) was promoted by the Directorate-General for Cultural Heritage (DGPC) in Portugal to gain comprehensive insights into the visitors of its museums. By partnering with CIES, the study aimed to generate reliable data about various aspects of museum visitation. Sponsored by the Millennium Foundation BCP and ONI, the study involved all the national museums managed by DGPC (fourteen), located across Lisbon Metropolitan Area, North, and Centre regions of Portugal. Through this partnership, DGPC endeavours to enhance knowledge about its museums and improve engagement with visitors, fostering a more enriching museum experience.

#### Producing knowledge by partnering with restaurants and the National Reading Plan 2027

restaurants association ARS funded a research line with three projects in the field of students' cultural reading practices: "Reading Practices of Portuguese Students"; "Evolution of Reading Practices of Primary and Secondary School Students – Barometer"; and "Reading Promotion Practices: Reading Mediators Survey". The projects were carried out in partnership with the "National Reading Plan 2027", a public policy that recognizes reading and literacy as essential tools for achieving educational success, enhancing the qualifications and competencies of the population, fostering sustainable growth, and advancing scientific and technological progress. This policy aligns with the objectives of the 2030 Agenda of the United Nations, the 2020 Europe Strategy, and the goals of 2020 Portugal.

#### CIES engaged in direct collaboration with 93 local, national, European and international non-academic institutions across 56 projects, with certain partners participating in multiple projects.

This highlights CIES's dedication to fostering social impact, partnership, and embracing interdisciplinary approaches. Partnering with non-academic entities enables researchers to tap into additional resources and expertise, enriching their research projects. More importantly, it allows for the application of theoretical knowledge in real-world contexts, fostering the development of solutions and making research outcomes more relevant and impactful.

The network of non-academic partner organisations comprises 44% international entities and encompasses a diverse array of institutions across multiple sectors.

Some organisations concentrate on specific areas such as autism support, literacy promotion, and cultural exchange, while others tackle broader issues such as equality, human rights, and sustainable development. Collectively, these institutions play crucial



#### Collaborative Laboratory for Work, Employment and Social Protection - CoLABOR

Iscte is an associate partner of the CoLABOR that comprises a team of researchers possessing diverse academic and professional backgrounds. It leverages resources from academia, corporations, governmental bodies, and social and solidarity economy organisations, with the aim of gaining a comprehensive understanding of current and anticipated challenges in three core areas: a) work and employment; b) social protection; and c) the social and solidarity economy. Notable national entities involved in social inclusion, such as Santa Casa da Misericórdia de Lisboa and Confederação Nacional das Instituições de Solidariedade, as well as three prominent corporations – Delta Cafés, Monta-Engil, and SONAE – are part of this initiative.




#### Tackling disinformation in Spain and Portugal

IBERIFIER is an Iberian hub that aims to tackle disinformation in Spain and Portugal by bringing together a consortium of 23 partners, composed of 12 universities, 5 independent fact-checking organisations and publicly owned news agencies, as Lusa, Agência de Notícias de Portugal SA (LUSA), and 6 leading institutions on strategic analysis, computer and data science, and media research. With the support of public authorities of both countries, relevant media organisations, several scientific and professional associations, as well as some other stakeholders, the activities of this Action comprise, among other goals, the development of media literacy, through a set of activities targeted mainly to young people, journalists and citizens in general.



roles in confronting societal challenges and fostering social advancement on both local and global scales (see box 3). Remarkably, non-academic partners were deeply involved in long-term collaborations, with projects typically spanning between three to four years. This commitment to sustained engagement is particularly evident in the field of migrations, where 48 local organisations, primarily non-profit and public entities, were active partners.

Moreover, public institutions engage significantly, representing 20% of all partners, and are particularly important in initiatives concerning migration and media. The involvement of private partners spans various sectors, with technology, education, and media companies taking the lead. Collaborations include communication agencies and news companies, offering extensive dissemination capabilities to reach broad audiences, as exemplified by the IBERIFIER project described in Box 4.



#### OUTCOMES IN THE FORM OF DIFFUSIONS PUBLISHING OUTSIDE ACADEMIA

The initiatives of CIES are geared towards making a positive impact on diverse audiences, spanning across sectors such as business, government, media, civil society, and public discourse. This contribution to broader intellectual and public debate occurs through the dissemination of products and active engagement with target communities both nationally and internationally. Among the array of over 30 products aimed at non-academic audiences, a quarter were international. Notable mentions include digital databases like CoLABOR, which provide statistical and legal information at international, national, and local levels on work, employment, and social protection. Additionally, websites, apps, and games such as "Violet Lives," which sheds light on women's experiences confronting gender stereotypes, are highlighted. Other formats encompass documentaries (see Box 5 and 6), photographic records, as well as books, toolkits, and technical reports developed in collaboration with non-academic partners as part of specific projects.

Diffusions in the form of interviews are also a significant part of these outputs, as in the case of "A Sociological Look at the Covid-19



#### Cultivating citizenship through ethnographic micro-documentaries

As a segment of the ArtCitizenship research initiative, which investigates the non-institutional spaces for cultivating citizenship and involvement in the public domain, "Ghetto Scenes" comprises a collection of 27 episodes. These illuminate the residents, artists, and heritage of Quinta do Mocho through ethnographic micro-documentaries. The series aims to explore the connections between art, creativity, and political engagement.

### OUTCOMES IN THE FORM OF ACTIVITIES PARTICIPATION AND ENGAGEMENT IN NON-ACADEMIC EVENTS

Social impact is also derived from close collaboration with user communities and non-academic partners through activities, participatory approaches, and co-creation of knowledge. Over one hundred events were organised, held, or participated in with non-academic partners in locations outside academia, engaging communities, stakeholders, and end users, among others. These events encompassed various formats, such as debate sessions open to all, science communication sessions, public screenings, art exhibitions/installations, jury contest participations, community discussions or film screenings. The target groups included the general public, decisionmakers, companies, interest groups, trade

in the construction of CISOC, a measure of the Portuguese National Arts Plan to enable cultural organisations to promote their social impact with audiences and communities based on a commitment. The CISOC KIT is a set of support tools that facilitate the implementation of the commitment. It corresponds to the publication Social Impact Commitment of Cultural Organisations.

Fundamentals, Methodology and Support Tools. Its implementation includes dissemination meetings and training activities in organisations. It was presented at an international conference held in December 2023.



#### Tackling failure and school dropout based on a European project

In 2021, CIES researchers were invited to perform two teacher training sessions on "Strategies to Combat School Failure and Dropout: Lessons from the Below 10 project" as part of the internal teacher training program at a Vocational Secondary School in Lisbon. This training initiative was inspired by, and directly connected with, the action research project "Below 10".

unions, and other civil society organisations. Venues ranged from cultural organisations (see box 8) to civil society organisations, foundations, city councils, consulates, cafes, schools, public libraries, film festivals, and public spaces in vulnerable and stigmatised neighbourhoods. Debate sessions and discussions include quite diverse topics such as housing, sexual work, human trafficking, transgender issues, populism, art and culture, among many others.

Other forms of dialogue with communities included training and knowledge transfer initiatives, the development of formal and informal consultancy and participation in the creative arts. Active participation in training initiatives targeting non-academic audiences has been developed, indicating a commitment to broadening the reach of knowledge dissemination beyond traditional academic spheres. Training activities include events as presentation and discussion of a film as a training activity in a hospital/health centre, training teachers in schools or school clusters (see box 9), perform training for cultural organisations aiming to promote the capacity and sustainability of civil society,

or organising seminar series on current changes in cities in several public locations in Lisbon.

The social impact of CIES-Iscte activities between 2018 and 2023 extends far beyond academia, demonstrating broader societal implications. Research objectives, going beyond scientific advancement, aim to address the needs of stakeholders and citizens both locally and globally by

creative forms of engagement, providing specialized training and disseminating knowledge. In essence, CIES's significant social impact stems from its dedication to public engagement and collaborative knowledge transfer, emphasizing diffusion, training, and interdisciplinary dialogue to achieve meaningful societal impact on both local and global scales.

## CIES in the Media


CIES researchers play a crucial role in shaping public discourse by sharing their expert views with the media. Their contributions provide greater clarity and depth to issues relevant to the media agenda. In addition, their perspectives often align with the themes of CIES studies or projects, making them a valuable resource for journalists and other media professionals.

Between 2018 and 2023, CIES researchers actively participated in television programs and debates on topics related to national and European elections, as well as on migration policies, covering a range of topics

relevant to the centre's agenda. They have also regularly contributed to newspaper columns.

Some researchers regularly contribute to national press columns and are often featured as guests on television programs, emphasizing the importance and relevance of their knowledge and experience. This consistent presence in the media underlines the ability of CIES researchers to influence and improve public debate, promoting a more informed and comprehensive understanding of current issues.










#### Promotion of Scientific Culture

CIES-Iscte is dedicated to making science accessible to all by promoting and disseminating its research.

The research team plays an essential role in advancing scientific culture, not only by sharing scientific knowledge



#### Agência Ciência Viva Initiatives

CIES partners with Agência Ciência Viva to participate in several initiatives every year. One of these initiatives is the 'Science in the Holidays for Young People' program, which offers high school students an exclusive opportunity to work alongside center researchers on several topics.

Another significant initiative is Science and Technology Week, where CIES welcomes secondary schools and encourages interaction and participatory debate on topics such as sustainability, politics, sociology, and communication. Through summer internships and secondary school visits, CIES highlights its work and the involvement of researchers in promoting and understanding scientific processes related to everyday topics.



#### European Researchers' Night

The European Researchers' Night is an annual event that aims to bridge the gap between scientists and the public. The event aims to demystify scientists as distant and inaccessible figures and raise awareness among young people about the importance of research and innovation in Europe. It provides an opportunity to share concerns and expectations about how science can solve contemporary problems.

The initiative invites universities, research centers, and schools from various European cities to participate in constructive debates on different fields of science to build a better future. CIES-lscte researchers have actively participated in animated debates, quizzes, exhibitions, and science coffees during the event.



#### Research Ethics

The Research Ethics Conduct Code, approved by Rectoral Decree n°. 86/2016 on 27 December 2016, regulates research at Iscte. This code establishes a set of ethical standards for research activities carried out by members of Iscte's organic units, including the School for Sociology and Public Policy (ESPP).

The ESPP's Ethics Committee reviews research conducted within CIES with the objective of providing appropriate support and oversight on the implementation of ethical and professional principles in research projects, doctoral theses, and publications. The Ethics Committee holds responsibility for ensuring and overseeing the promotion of ethical standards to protect and guarantee integrity, dignity, honesty, and ethical quality in research activities, considering the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR), that highlights the importance of safeguarding personal information.

By putting forward comprehensive guidelines concerning the handling, storage, and use of personal data, guaranteeing that individuals' privacy rights are respected and protected, the GDPR emphasises transparency, consent and accountability in data processing activities, marking a significant step towards the reinforcement of individuals' control over their personal data. Within the research domain, adherence to ethical norms concerning data protection implies securing informed consent, anonymisation or pseudonymisation of data, and confidentiality to protect participants' privacy.

The foundations of ethical research are provided by informed consent, guaranteeing participants' awareness of the nature, objectives, and presumed potential risks the proposed research may entail before agreeing to participate. As for anonymisation and pseudonymisation, these data protection instruments reduce the risks implicit in personal data violations and preserve participants' anonymity. Anonymisation removes all identifiers irreversibly, making re-identification impossible, while pseudonymisation allows the data to be de-identified but potentially re-identified with additional information. Despite being closely associated, confidentiality and data protection serve distinct purposes. Confidentiality focuses on the duty of keeping secret information shared in confidence, whereas data protection covers a wider range of practices aimed at ensuring the security, integrity, and privacy of personal data.

The ESPP Ethics Committee's reviews seek to distinguish between confidentiality, privacy, and data protection by following the GDPR's framework for data protection. Implementing informed consent, anonymisation, and pseudonymisation allows researchers to ensure their work's ethical integrity and legal compliance. Ultimately, this comprehensive approach to data protection not only safeguards participants' rights but also enhances the credibility and reliability of the research processes.

Thus, the Ethics Committee that reviews the work of CIES members seeks to promote adherence to ethical principles in research with the ultimate objective of defending the quality of research. This entails protecting the dignity, safety and well-being of research participants whilst simultaneously safeguarding the security and reputation of researchers themselves.

#### Open Science

Open science aims to make research and data accessible. CIES does so by ensuring transparency, collaboration, sharing knowledge and by encouraging open access to research publications, data, methods, and tools.

The goal is to make science more inclusive, by accelerating and improving the accessability of research. There are multiple ways to do so. Key practices include open data, open access journals, open-source software, collaborative platforms, adhering to Open Research Europe, identifying predadory journals and contributing to peer-reviewing of scientific publications.

The Centre adheres to the FCT policy for Open Access of Scientific Publications and utilize the Open Access Scientific Repositories of Portugal (RCAAP) and the Online Knowledge Library (b-on).



#### **Gender Equality**

CIES-Iscte's gender equality principles are deeply aligned with Iscte's "Equality, Diversity, and Inclusion Plan."

The Centre's initiatives focus on fostering gender equality through four key dimensions:

#### **Equality**

Ensuring gender balance in leadership roles and equal access to all positions by applying gender-neutral selection criteria. CIES-Iscte also promotes inclusivity by ensuring its physical spaces, such as gender-neutral bathrooms, are accessible and welcoming to individuals of all gender identities.

#### Monitoring

CIES-Iscte regularly monitors the progress of gender parity across all positions and updates its Gender Equality Plan to ensure continued improvement.

#### Work-Life Balance

CIES promotes a flexible work environment, including remote work options, enabling researchers with caregiving responsibilities to balance their professional, family, and personal lives. The institute also adheres to the "Code of Conduct for the Prevention and Combating of Workplace Harassment," maintaining a zero-tolerance policy towards any form of harassment.

#### **Knowledge Production**

The Centre develops numerous research projects and initiatives targeting the academic community, policymakers, and the broader public.

These efforts are committed to deconstructing stereotypes, addressing social dynamics that legitimize gender asymmetries and hierarchies, and fostering greater awareness of gender-related issues.

As a result, CIES-Iscte has made significant strides in advancing gender equality within its leadership, contributed extensively to the promotion of knowledge in gender studies, and integrated gender considerations into its physical infrastructure, ensuring a truly inclusive and equitable environment for all.
